## COLOMBIA (Period 1859-1883)

Stanley Gibbons, who refer to Colombia as "this interesting country", record that "the early issues were mostly cancelled with pen and ink as hand-stamps were furnished to very few places".

Herein lies the reason for the small range of postmarks. Dumb cancellations are very few: Fig. 12 in black and

Fig. 13 in scarlet are two examples.

Town cancels predominate and these are generally contained in a single-line oval. Bogota employed at least three types, viz.: *Fig.* 1—1859 issue, in black; *Fig.* 5—1865–70 issue, in black; *Fig.* 6—1868–70 issue, in black: also in blue.

For Medellin (Fig. 4) and Santa-Marta, among other towns, and on the 5 cent Registration stamp of 1865, the cancellation is known in blue. Velez (Fig. 3) in black and blue is typical of several towns.

BARBACOAS (Fig. 7), BUCARAMANCA and other towns used

this cancellation together with Fig. 10.

COLOMBIA (Fig. 8) in purple is found on 1883 issues.

COLON (Fig. 9) in blue, was used in PANAMA when Panama was part of Colombia.

BARRANQUILLA (Fig. 11) in circle is found in black.
