PERU (Period 1858-1871)

Pre-stamp covers of Peru are scarce, and, when found usually carry the name "Peru" in capital letters of several types. They are nearly always struck in red. The word Franca occurs upon them sometimes, usually in black.

Later, town cancellations, cut by the respective post-masters, came into use and these are found on the first adhesive stamps: PIURA, JAUJA, HUANCAYO, etc. (Figs. 1, 2, 3).

Subsequent to these came the town name in small capitals, usually abbreviated for places with more than five letters in the name, surrounded by a three-ring oval of dots (Fig. 4).

The circular date-stamp followed (\overline{Figs} . 5, 6, 7). Of these there is an extensive range in a variety of types and sizes.

"DUMB" cancellations number only about 20, LIMA (Fig. 8), a five-pointed star (Fig. 9), flower-like cancels (Figs. 10, 11, 12, 13) among them.

"FANCY"-Town cancels are numerous, e.g. Puno (Fig. 14) and Putina (Fig. 15).

"SHIP" cancellations, usually a hand-stamped VAPOR, sometimes with the name of the town, can be found in wide variety (Figs. 16, 17).

For an authoritively complete list of all known postmarks and offices, collectors are referred to "Perou, Oblitérations Postales" by Georges Lamy & Jacques-Andre Rinck, published in 1960.
